# 18th U.S. SURGEON GENERAL (2009-2013) REGINA BENJAMIN NAMED ENDOWED CHAIR AT XAVIER UNIVERSITY OF LOUISIANA *Xavier to be Positioned as International Center for Public Health*

NEW ORLEANS (September 13, 2013) – The 18th Surgeon General of the United States (2009-2013) Regina Benjamin, MD, MBA was announced as the first *NOLA.com/Times Picayune Endowed Chair in Public Health Sciences* at Xavier University of Louisiana during a press conference this morning.

"I am honored to be named the Endowed Chair in Public Health at Xavier University of Louisiana," said Benjamin. "I look forward to positioning Xavier as an international center for public health with a strong focus on the community."

Benjamin is a long-time champion of the power of prevention. As Surgeon General, she lead the U.S. Public Health Service and chaired President Obama's National Prevention Council, which released the first-ever *National Prevention Strategy*– a road map for a healthy and fit nation. She oversaw its implementation throughout the federal government.

"In July, I stepped away from my position but not from my mission," Benjamin stated. "This endowed chair at Xavier provides an ideal platform from which I can broaden my mission of prevention and wellness."

An alumna of the only Historically Black Catholic University in the nation, Benjamin will have a major role in developing future public health professionals. Former Surgeons General often go to medical schools or large academic health centers, rarely, if ever, to a liberal arts college. Benjamin wants to bring public health to the community and to have students engage early in their careers. Xavier has consistently ranked number one in the nation in awarding bachelor's degrees to African American students in biology, chemistry, physics, and the physical sciences. The university is also renowned for ranking number one in the nation in the number of African-American students who go to and complete medical school.

"Having the 18th Surgeon General join our family is a milestone achievement for Xavier University, the city of New Orleans, the state of Louisiana, and the United States of America," said Dr. Norman Francis, President of Xavier University. "I am honored to have Dr. Benjamin join our public health program and grow it into a global force for promoting healthy communities."

The United States ranks low in health outcomes compared to other industrialized nations- with Louisiana and Mississippi tied for 49 out of 50 in the 2012 America's Health Rankings. Louisiana and the Gulf Coast provide a unique geographic setting with a concentrated mix of public health challenges, e.g., large populations of the medically underserved, obesity rates above the national average, limited access to available health care, and high rates of chronic diseases across the life stages. This offers an excellent "public health laboratory" in which the results from research and training can have a global impact on the requirements needed to make a community more resilient.

"As Health Commissioner, I am thrilled that my friend and colleague Dr. Benjamin has chosen to return to our community to lend her considerable talent, experience, and passion. I look forward to collaborating with her to make New Orleans one of America's most healthy cities." said Dr. Karen DeSalvo, New Orleans Health Commissioner.

Dr. Benjamin's role will include reviewing curriculum and cementing Xavier's position as an international thought center on public health. Working closely with Xavier's School of Pharmacy, Arts and Sciences, and Center for Health and Health Disparities Research, Benjamin will help develop the new Department of Public Health Sciences, teach classes, and coordinate national and international conferences in New Orleans.

The 50<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the Surgeon General Warning on the Cigarette package will be in 2014. Plans to leverage the anniversary and host an international conference on tobacco use prevention is being considered as one of Benjamin's first undertakings as Endowed Chair as she continues her Tobacco Free College Campuses focus.

An endowment from NOLA.com/The Times-Picayune helps support the new position that Benjamin will fill.

Benjamin will continue to volunteer at the BayouClinic she founded in Bayou La Batre, Al. (an hour and 45 minutes away), which she kept in operation despite damage and destruction inflicted by hurricanes Georges (1998) and Katrina (2005) and a devastating fire (2006). This will allow her to maintain her clinical skills and stay close with her patients.

As a Catholic institution, the ultimate mission of Xavier is to create a just and humane society by preparing its students for leadership and service. The university's education and culture prepares graduates for continual spiritual, moral and intellectual development.

"Dr. Benjamin's care not only of her patients, but of the entire American population, embodies the University's mission and is an example of how Xavier educates the whole person," said Xavier University of Louisiana Provost Loren Blanchard. "Dr. Benjamin's career provides numerous examples that students can use to grow from both personally, spiritually, and professionally. Her example of working under the most adverse circumstances to deliver health care without compromising quality will teach students to use their knowledge in critical and creative ways to better their communities."
